community.

The storm started on the west side of town, first taking the roof off the Paoli Police and Fire Department, and also damaging Huck's and Down Home Primitives.

The winds then hit the square significantly damaging the roof of Reflections and leaving them with other damage. Above Reflections there are apartments and since the shop suffered roof damages the people living in those apartments will have to move into temporary houses until homes can be replaced.

Just up from Reflections, Maggie's shop had been closed since last year's fire due to damage to inventory and a crack in the window was finished off by the high winds.

The storm continued on to remove three chimneys from the Courthouse and then removed a portion of the roof from Liberty Furniture.

The Lost River Market and Deli suffered roof damage as well, losing a portion of the roof.

The estimated cost for the repair is over a million dollars. The area of town that was affected the worst is the square.

With the building housing the police station damaged, help was called in from West Baden, Orleans, French Lick, Indiana State Police and Indiana Conservation.

Officers say that no loitering took place after the storm, but some people were caught trying to steal metal. Since the Police and Fire Station was damaged, there will be a temporary mobile station put in the parking lot until things get fixed.

And then the lights were out

Power outages started around 7:45 p.m. Monday night right when the storm hit strong. Town power came back on around midnight but the whole town was not on until two in the morning.

Even at 2 a.m. not all houses had power and after that, individual scattered outages started to receive power again. The winds mostly caused the outages along with tree limbs.

Three linemen were on the job trying to get the power on, and other people from the community also stepped in to help.

A lineman suggested that residents should try turning the breaker off when an outage happens. This can help the linemen get the power on faster. By turning on and off the breaker this helps pick up the load so that the lines can kick back on.

Residents will now be waiting for the damage to be repaired from the storm.
