PHS students participated in a survey asking their opinions on stereotyping. Not every student participated and some surveys were returned anonymously. As a staff we were curious to see how many students felt that they were stereotyped by others. The survey asked what category each individual felt they would be. The categories to choose from were: jock, nerd, prep, emo, gothic, cheerleader,

the good kid, class clown, teacher's pet, hick, cool, musician, the artsy kid, drama queen and the wallflower. Many students chose to write in other stereotypes. Out of 249 students (freshmen through seniors) who answered, 161 said that yes, they feel that they are stereotyped by others.
